Kathy and Alice were delighted to be invited along to this session with the Guides and were impressed with their views and how they debated with each other.



Deputy Mayor Alice Samuel was pleased to visit 2nd Crewkerne Brownies. The Brownies took Alice around the town and the churchyard where they put up some of their wonderful anti-dog fouling posters they made earlier in the year.

Alice commented "We are so fortunate to have lovely walks in Crewkerne and it is so healthy to exercise with your dog, both physically and mentally, but those people who do not pick up their dog's poo are setting a poor reputation for those who are responsible. It is wonderful that young children are so passionate to keep their town clean and give their time to take action by placing posters."



## GRC - update

The George Reynolds Centre under Town Council management is growing into a real community hub. Two evenings a week the Town Council's Youth Service provides engaging and lively sessions to two groups – one for children aged 4-11 and one for the 11+ youngsters. In total, over 200 different young people are currently accessing the Youth Service in the GRC.

The GRC is now offering a home to the Community Kitchen to assist them with their plans to expand and offer more food and meals to those in need and divert produce from landfill. They have, to date, given away 31,000 meals worth of food and the Town Council, through offering the use of the GRC as their base, is pleased to be able to support them in hopefully giving away many thousands more meals to our community. The Rugby Club operates a sports bar several times a week and uses the Centre as a hub for their home fixtures – again, many local rugby players both in youth, senior, womens and veterans teams are making use of this community facility.

The Centre is also used by the football club and cricket club, for various other community groups and houses a local preschool. Most weeks there is something happening in the Centre on most days/evenings. The Town Council plans to continue to support and grow this level of activity in the George Reynolds Centre.

The rooms, bar and kitchen are available for hire and all are welcome to book and use it to help it continue to grow as a community hub for the town.

The team have also now developed a website where you can keep up to date with how the Plan is evolving and how you can get involved.

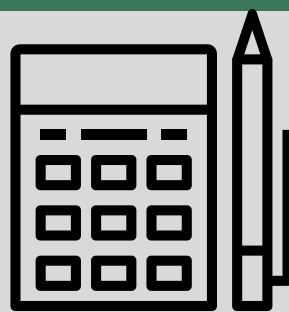

## Budget 2023-24: a tough call

Although the start of the new financial year may seem like some time away, budgeting preparations at Town Hall have been underway for some time already.

It is already clear that we are all living in very different times and the cost-of-living crisis is at the front of councillors' minds as they consider which projects they can and can't afford to proceed with in 2023-24.

Mayor of Crewkerne, Cllr. Kathy Head commented, "It is quite clear that we have tough decisions to make. The Town Council is facing increased costs from its suppliers and contractors. Particularly notable are the rising utility bills which we must pay in order to keep our community venues open so that our clubs and societies can continue to meet and support their members. Councillors understand that financial pressures are increasing and want people to know that we are mindful of this when setting our budget."

Crewkerne Town Council will set its precept at the January meeting of Full Council.

# Fixy's coming back!



Back by popular demand, Fixy McFixface, the county repair bus will be back in Crewkerne on Saturday 18th February to coincide with the Farmers' Market and Town Council surgery.

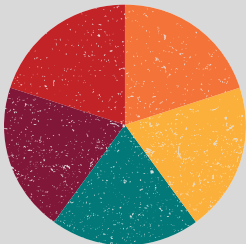
Fixy is a joint initiative between Somerset Waste Partnership and Donate IT, collecting unwanted electronic items to be repaired where possible and passed on to schools, refugees, elderly and isolated people. Anything that cannot be fixed is recycled.

Since Fixy's launch in May, over 300 items have been donated ranging from laptops and tablets to smart phones and digital cameras. Somerset-based Donate IT securely wipes the device before it goes to a new home.

## Barn Street: consultation results

Following the recent public consultation held on possible improvements to Barn Street Recreation Area, the results have been collated:

- ✓ 60% agreed that a pathway would enhance their use of Barn Street Rec.
- ✓ 74% were in favour of planting more trees
- ✓ Only 23% said NO to community planting areas
- ✓ 87% agreed that Barn Street Rec should have managed wildflower areas
- ✓ 53% wanted a directional sign pointing out sites of local interest
- ✓ Similarly, 54% would like to see a noticeboard for local events



Thank you to everyone who responded - 67 in total. Whilst there is no budget to carry out significant works at present, this is a useful indication of how the town sees the area developing.

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
